

### FRIDAY MORNING GUEST SPEAKER

#### Matt Dunfee Wildlife Management Institute

The future of hunting and recreational shooting sports and a significant source of funding for conservation depend on recruiting new participants. Recruitment has to expand to include millennials, urban and suburban residents, and more ethnically diverse audiences. Matt Dunfee will highlight a national strategy to recruit more hunters and recreational shooters and identify opportunities for the League to help implement that strategy.



Matt Dunfee is the Programs Manager for the Wildlife Management Institute. Following his leadership in developing evaluation toolkits for hunter and recreational shooter R3 (recruit, retain, reengage) efforts, Matt has conducted numerous multi-day training and information workshops for state and federal wildlife agency staff and administrators on R3 strategies, program development, evaluation, and best practices. He previously worked as a program coordinator for the Center for Environmental Management on Military Lands and as a research associate with the National Park Service's Bison Management Working Group. Matt received his bachelor's degree in fish, wildlife, and conservation biology from Colorado State University.

#### Tuesday, July 25

Youth Convention opens with a pizza buffet at Chet and Matt's Pizza (a local favorite) and private pool party at the Kalahari Resort's Sands Pool Area.

#### Wednesday, July 26

Start the day with shooting sports and lunch at the League's Monroeville-Huron County Chapter. In the afternoon, venture behind the scenes at "Back to the Wild" Wildlife Rehabilitation Center, which is home to more than 50 hawks and owls, bald eagles, herons, bobcats, bunnies, and more — animals that were too injured to be returned to the wild after rehabilitation.

#### Thursday, July 27

Learn about fishery management at Old Woman Creek National Estuarine Research Reserve — one of Ohio's last examples of a natural estuary. After lunch at the Marblehead Lighthouse,



get a lesson on aquatic research at the Lake Erie Research Center and explore boatbuilding, ice harvesting, shipwrecks, and more at the Maritime Museum of Sandusky.

Have fun fishing after a habitat restoration project at Great Egret Marsh Preserve, which geologists believe was once the channel of the Portage River. After lunch, you'll have the afternoon to enjoy water sports at East Harbor State Park, a hayride at Bergman's Orchard, and a sweet treat at Toft's (Ohio's oldest dairy).

#### **Introduction to Save Our Streams**

One Time Only at 2:15pm

Join this introductory session to learn exactly what you need to get your chapter or community group involved in Save Our Streams (SOS) water quality monitoring! League staff will walk you through our new Getting Started Tool Kit, which includes step-by-step instructions for recruiting volunteers, obtaining basic monitoring equipment, and conducting science-based stream monitoring. This session will help you jump start stream monitoring at your chapter and work toward the finish line of our Clean Water Challenge.

#### Save Our Streams for Experienced Monitors

One Time Only at 3:30pm

Save Our Streams is getting some upgrades! This session is designed with experienced monitors in mind. Learn about the changes being made to our protocols for stream monitoring, making it more efficient and less time consuming, and how to adapt your existing monitoring program. Participants will receive tools and information

to modernize their programs as we work to achieve the League's goal of monitoring 100,000 more streams by 2022.

The League's volunteer leaders devote their time, talent, and expertise to advance the League's mission. Ensuring the League is effective, visible, and strong for the future depends on building leadership skills and capacity at all levels. This workshop, co-hosted by the League's Executive Board Chair and National President, is specifically designed for national directors and chapter presidents. It will focus on developing leadership capacity, improving communication among leaders, and strengthening collaboration among the national organization, divisions, and chapters. #### **BANQUET SPEAKER**

### STANLEY TEMPLE ALDO LEOPOLD FOUNDATION

Many people today are unaware that the Izaak Walton League was as a source of information, inspiration, and political influence when Aldo Leopold was developing his ideas about our relationship with nature. Aldo Leopold was an early and lifetime member of the League, and he often relied on the League's extensive network of local chapters as his eyes and ears on the ground in his conservation endeavors. Professor Temple will retrace that relationship and explain why Leopold's "land ethic" should be an important component of the League's water quality initiatives today.

Stanley Temple is the Beers-Bascom Professor Emeritus in Conservation in the Department of Forest and Wildlife Ecology and former chairman of the Conservation Biology and Sustainable Development Program in the Gaylord Nelson Institute for Environmental Studies at the University of Wisconsin-Madison. For 32 years, he held the academic position once occupied by Aldo Leopold, and during that time



he won every teaching award for which he was eligible. He and his students have helped save many of the world's endangered species and the habitats on which they depend. He is currently a senior fellow with the Aldo Leopold Foundation. He has been president of the Society for Conservation Biology and chairman of the board of The Nature Conservancy in Wisconsin.



### **BUSINESS**

### CONVENTION DELEGATES AND BUSINESS

Delegates are the IWLA chapters' official representatives at the national convention, and they play a key role in determining the League's direction for the coming year. In addition to electing national officers, delegates serve on committees and vote on conservation policy resolutions.

Chapters may elect or appoint their delegates. The number of delegates allotted to each chapter is determined by the chapter's size. (Allotments are listed on pages 9-10.) Allotments are based on membership figures from the end of the previous year.

After a chapter has named its delegates, the delegate accreditation form on page 11 must be completed by a chapter official and submitted to the national office by June 23. Delegates also must present a signed accreditation form at the convention's registration table to receive delegate credentials.

#### Your Voice in League Policy

The convention provides all members and chapters an opportunity to participate in IWLA conservation policy-making through national resolutions. Proposed national resolutions should be sent to the national office as soon as possible. No resolutions will be accepted after July 12, 2017.

Every year, Ikes, chapters, and divisions draft resolutions outlining recommendations to local, state, and federal agencies and others about various natural resource issues. Each resolution submitted is considered by an appropriate resource committee composed of members appointed by the League's national president. The resource committees are the following:

- Fish and Wildlife
- Public Lands
- •Sustainable Resources
- Agricultural Affairs
- •Energy and Environment
- •Water Resources
- Outdoor Ethics
- •Environmental Education

A separate resolutions committee — consisting of the chairs of each resource committee — makes final recommendations on resolutions before they are presented to convention delegates for a vote. Lee Hays of Maryland is chairman of the Resolutions Committee. Resolutions that are formally adopted become official League policy and guide the position statements of League staff, officers, and members.

All resolution submissions should do the following:

- State that the proposal is intended for consideration at the national convention.
- •Be written in simple essay form (not in the "whereas style").

- •Include background articles, fact sheets, studies or other information to give the committee a better understanding of the issue and its importance.
- •Identify and credit the author of the resolution.
- •Identify someone familiar with the resolution and its history who will be prepared to speak to the committee at the convention.

#### **Bylaw Changes**

Proposed amendments to the IWLA Bylaws must be submitted by Friday, June 9, 2017, to receive consideration at the convention. Chuck Clayton, chairman of the Governance and Bylaws Committee, requests that a proposed amendment have the backing of a chapter or division if originated by a chapter member.

### VOTING AT THE CONVENTION

Each delegate is entitled to one vote. However, if the number of chapter delegates at any session is less than the number of delegates to which the chapter is entitled, the chapter delegation may collectively cast the same number of votes as the number of delegates to which that chapter is entitled.

Each chapter is entitled to name one alternate for each delegate. However, an accredited alternate may vote only in the absence of the original delegate. (For more specific information about the voting rights of delegates and alternates, see Article 7, Section 7.5 of the IWLA Bylaws.)

Major actions of delegates include voting on adoption of convention rules; approving minutes from last year's convention; electing national officers, regional governors, and directors at large; voting on policy resolutions; and voting on the national convention site.

#### **Board of Directors**

The Board of Directors is composed of the national president, vice president, treasurer, and secretary, in addition to regional governors, past national presidents, national directors, and directors at large. The directors will hold a short meeting during the convention.

Major actions of the Board include approving minutes of the midwinter meeting, voting on proposed bylaws amendments, and electing Executive Board members.

#### **IWLA Endowment Board**

All members of the League are also members of the IWLA Endowment Inc., a separate corporation that receives earmarked and general contributions for financing conservation projects. The Endowment Board will hold a meeting during the convention, and a slate of candidates for election to the Board will be presented. Any Ike at the convention may vote for the candidates.

The National Officer Nominating Committee also is responsible for presenting a roster of candidates for positions of directors at large. Directors at large represent the interests of states without divisions on the Board of Directors. Terms are three years, and there are three vacancies this year.

**Dr. Jeffrey Reutter** *Ohio State University/Ohio Sea Grant* 

As harmful algal blooms threaten water quality, public health, and outdoor recreation across the country, Dr. Jeffrey Reutter will highlight the main causes of algal blooms and the role citizens can play in reducing the threat.

is an aquatic biologist and frequent lecturer on the changing Lake Erie ecosystem, harmful algal blooms, aquatic invasive species, and the importance science communication with the public. He served as director of the Stone Laboratory, Ohio Sea Grant College Program, Center for Lake Erie Area Research, and Great Lakes Aquatic Ecosystem Research Consortium — all run by The Ohio State University — from 1987 to 2015. He is now a part-time special advisor for these programs. He also served on the Council of Great Lakes Research Managers for the International Joint Commission for 21 years. Dr. Reutter received his bachelor's and master's degrees in fisheries management and a Ph.D. in environmental biology from The Ohio State University.
