Iowans Crowdfund to Save State's Water Monitoring Network

Grassroots campaign launches to restore critical University of Iowa program

DES MOINES, Iowa — **September 29, 2025** — In a state defined by its rivers, lakes, and farmland, Iowans are now being asked to do something unprecedented: crowdfund to keep their water safe. Following a \$500,000 budget cut, the University of Iowa's long-standing water monitoring program—one of the state's most vital tools for tracking nitrate pollution, harmful algal blooms, and overall water quality—faces collapse.

For more than a decade, the program operated without a single funding increase. Now, lowa is on the verge of going from 90 active monitoring sites to just 20, leaving communities across the state without essential data to safeguard drinking water, recreation, and ecosystems.

Why It Matters

- \$500,000 per year: Keeps the network running at its most basic capacity.
- **\$600,000 per year**: Fully funds operations, equipment renewal, and professional data analysis.

"From rural wells to municipal water systems, and from lowa's rivers to the Gulf of Mexico's Dead Zone, the monitoring network plays a vital role in protecting public health and environmental resilience. Without it, lowans lose transparency and accountability during a worsening water quality crisis" says Dale Braun, President of the lowa Division of the Izaak Walton League of America representing 7,000 members in the state.

Who's Leading the Effort

The Iowa Division of the Izaak Walton League of America is spearheading a statewide crowdfunding campaign to sustain the monitoring network. The effort will be spotlighted at the upcoming **Iowa Nature Summit**, a major gathering focused on conservation and environmental action.

"The lowa Nature Summit is excited to partner with the Ike's on this critical project," said **Prof.**Neil Hamilton of Drake University, Summit organizer. "One of our core goals is to identify concrete actions lowans can take to protect our natural resources. Funding the water monitors gives us the information needed to make smarter decisions about improving lowa's water quality."
